



Frequently Asked Questions About the June 2026 Ballot Measure to Establish the Office of Mayor as an Elected Position

Q: What is the June 2026 ballot measure asking voters to decide?

A: The ballot measure question asks voters to decide if the City of Pinole should add Chapter 2.10 to the Pinole Municipal Code to establish the office of mayor as an elected position.

Q: Why was this placed on the ballot?

A: On February 3, 2026, the City Council approved holding a special election to ask voters whether Pinole should have an elected Mayor. This action followed the Council's earlier direction on December 2, 2025, for staff to prepare the necessary materials for this question.

Q: What is the cost for holding a ballot measure in June 2026?

A: The cost was projected to be between \$37,236 to \$55,854 in the (link:) [February 3, 2026 staff report](#).

Q: What is the current process to elect Pinole mayors?

A: The City of Pinole currently conducts at-large elections, in which each of the five council members are elected by registered voters of Pinole. The position of mayor rotates amongst the councilmembers on an annual basis following a long-standing tradition of prioritizing the council member who received the highest number of votes in the prior election to serve in the role of mayor.

Q: How would having an elected mayor impact me?

A: If approved, voters would be asked to elect a mayor following an election schedule that will be determined during the June 2026 Special Election (voters will be asked if the term of office of mayor should be two or four years).

Q: What new powers would an elected mayor have?

A: An elected mayor would still be a member of the City Council and would have all the powers and duties of a member of the City Council. In addition, an elected mayor shall have the power to make appointments to boards, commissions, and committees, subject to approval of the City Council. The mayor also may request the Governor to proclaim a state of emergency within the boundaries of Pinole. Finally, an elected mayor may collect a salary in addition to the salary established for council members if approved by the electorate or by ordinance adopted by the City Council.

Q: What would be the fiscal impact of having an elected mayor?

A: If approved, the new ordinance Chapter 2.10 would set the mayor's compensation at the same rate as that established for members of the City Council and be provided health and welfare benefits as are provided for City employees.
